PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What does home mean to you? For most of us, home is a place of comfort, safety, privacy, and family. Home is a place where we can really relax and be ourselves.

For too many women and children in Peel Region, home is a different kind of place -- a place of insults, anger, fear, and violence.

Over the past 25 years, over 30,000 courageous women and their children have come to Interim Place to begin the difficult journey toward lives free from abuse. We have provided support for the first step – leaving. And we have been there to help them go on to establish strong, new, independent lives.

Current social service funding in Peel Region puts a significant strain on budgets and revenue streams for all social service agencies in Peel. As reported in the collaborative report "Portraits of Peel: Facing the Facts", social service agencies in Peel are grossly underfunded relative to agencies in other Ontario municipalities. Social service funding in Peel has not kept pace with our exponential population growth and rapidly increasing diversity. According to the report, people in the Region of Peel "do not have equal access to essential human services that citizens in other areas can count on. They wait longer and receive less service because of this funding inequity."

For Interim Place, this means that in 2005, we turned away women seeking shelter over 700 times due to a lack of space. The funding constraints in Peel also mean that Interim Place must raise almost one third of its financial support through fundraising efforts. Every dollar donated to Interim Place helps us address this funding shortfall. Within this context, we recognize that the support we receive from the community truly makes our work possible.

Thank you to our volunteers, staff, community partners, funders, and donors. I wish to recognize the work of so many over the past 25 years. Everyone we have worked with has played a role in making Interim Place stronger as an organization and ready to meet the needs of the brave women who set a true example of courage and give us the privilege of playing a small, but important role in their life journeys. To these women, we say thank you.

Together we can make our community a place of opportunity for women who seek to make their homes a place to grow, learn, love, and live for themselves and their children.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

SHELTERS

Interim Place shelters (North and South) provide 39 emergency beds for women and children leaving abuse. The Shelters operate two 24-hour crisis lines and are open 365 days of the year. The shelters provide crisis support, counselling, information and referral, advocacy and programs that help women and children begin the long journey towards healing. In 2005/2006, we **sheltered 308 women and 228 children**, and helped them establish new lives free from violence. Our Shelter crisis line received **5,355 calls** for assistance and we provided over **13,000 days of residential care** and **over 14,000 hours** (of counselling and support services) to women and children in our two emergency shelters.

The Shelters serve a racially, culturally and linguistically diverse group of women and children and include young women, older women, women with disabilities, immigrant and refugee women, LGBTQ women and Aboriginal women. We seek to reflect on our staff teams the diversity of the community and women we serve. We have Counsellors who provide specific support to adult women, and Child and Youth Advocates who provide specific support and programs to assist children and youth. We also have dedicated advocates who provide specialized support in the areas of legal and housing.

The Shelter teams work with women to assist them to secure income, housing and other community supports which will enable them to safely and successfully transition from Shelter to the community.

In 2005/2006, we provided a variety of programs including women's support groups, groups for mothers and children and many social, recreational and educational programs throughout the year. Two programs we ran in partnership with the community were "Family Matters" a weekly parenting workshop offered by Family Education Centre and a Child Development Infant Program provided by Children's Services, Region of Peel.

TRANSITIONAL & HOUSING SUPPORT

The Transitional & Housing Support Program (THSP) provides a variety of services to abused women, including counselling, housing support, information, referrals and advocacy. THSP Workers serve women who are dealing with abuse in their intimate relationships, who have left or are planning to leave their abusive partners and who require support and assistance as they transition to violence free lives. The THSP Workers also assist women with safety planning, life skills, legal aid applications, income support and parenting. Referrals are made to employment and job training services, education and ESL classes, immigration, legal and Victim Services and ethno-racial and culturally specific community services. Transition Support Workers will accompany women to court or lawyer's appointments.

The Transitional Housing and Support Program served **774 women and 1160 children** in 2005/2006. We served 20% more women than in the previous year. Approximately 23% of the women came from our shelters, with the remaining 77% from the community. 42% were living in abusive situations at the time they sought assistance from the program.

There is a strong focus on outreach to women within the community. Many of our THSP Workers work directly out of community agencies. This close work with community partners is vital in reaching women and helping them find support to address the violence in their lives.

The program serves a racially and culturally diverse group of women. The THSP workers speak a variety of languages including Polish, Spanish, Farsi, Arabic, Punjabi, Hindi, Urdu and Caribbean dialects. For clients who speak other languages all supports and services are provided through the use of interpreters. One trend that we are noticing in the program is a slight increase in the number of

senior age women who are looking for service because of abuse they are experiencing from their children.

Referrals to the THSP come from a variety of sources including other VAW agencies, community agencies and services, past clients and, of course, the two shelter locations of Interim Place. Of the total women referred to the program in 2005-2006, 23% came from the shelter, 64% from community agencies and services and 19% from other sources, including law firms, doctor's offices, friends, relatives and through the THSP intake line.

The Transitional & Housing Support Program (THSP) at Interim Place continued to expand in 2006. The Program acquired three additional staff in 2005, bringing the total to nine workers. This vibrant and vital program continues to respond to the needs of women who are seeking support and advocacy.

WORKING TO END VIOLENCE IN OUR COMMUNITY


Interim Place is a proud member of the Peel Committee Against Woman Abuse and the Peel Committee on Sexual Assault. We are also a member of the Heal Network. This 15-member community agency collaboration works with children age 0-16 years who have been exposed to woman abuse. Interim Place is also a member of the Ontario Association of Interval and Transition Houses (OAITH), which is a public advocacy association representing first stage and second stage shelters across the Province of Ontario.

On a program and service level Interim Place has many community partnerships. We operate joint programs, share resources, provide information and referral and work on community collaborations and issues that impact women and children.

Within our Shelters we work closely with many community services some of these include; other emergency shelters, income security supports, legal services, children's services, newcomer/ settlement services, education and housing.

The Transitional and Housing Support team works within specific community agencies to provide support to abused women. These community agencies include Armagh House, Catholic Family Services, Catholic Cross Cultural Services, Dixie-Bloor Neighbourhood Services, India Rainbow Community Services, Malton Neighbourhood Services, Trillium Health Services Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Services, and United Achievers Community Services. This year the THSP team also co-facilitated support groups with Catholic Family Services for women whose partners are involved in the Partner Abuse Program.

Interim Place is a member agency of the United Way of Peel Region and we have been part of the United Way Speakers Bureau. Our Board and staff have been involved in public speaking to both raise awareness around the issue of woman abuse and the important work that the United Way does within the community.


